In loving memory of Barbara Redding Weaver who passed away on November 6, 2019, born 8/25/1928 Columbus Ohio where she attended North High School. Barbara is survived by her daughter Kathi Weaver (Russ Klein); niece Stephanie Mitchell (Chris); brother-in law Bob Stafford; great niece Delaney Roush; nephews Eric Schifter (Wendy), Scott Schifter (Joan) and Stephen Schifter (Catherine); and nieces Susan Labarth and Trudi Schifter (Hanspeter) as well as many special and treasured friends.

Barbara and Bill were married in 1955 at the Washington Memorial Chapel, Valley Forge PA. Their daughter Kathi was born April 1962. Over the year's family life for Barbara, Bill and Kathi included time with their beloved Newfoundland dogs, their cats and fishing vacations at Lake of the Woods, Kenora Ontario Canada. These vacations included the family dogs and for several years the family cats went along as well. Niece Stephanie joined them for vacations at Walt Disney World and Disneyland. Barbara and Bill's adventures included Churchill Manitoba to see the polar bears, Alaska, British Columbia and Vancouver Island.

Vacations to Lake of the Woods held a special place in Barbara's heart as it was there 50 years ago, she met her best friend Sandra Madder. Barbara and Sandra shared a love of travel and adventure. There isn't a topic they could not discuss for hours. Barbara will be missed very much by Sandra.

Barbara's hobbies included photography, woodworking, watercolor painting, extensive reading and computer art.

A proud graduate of The OSU School of Nursing Class of 1952, Barbara began her career in TB nursing and then taught at OSU, earning her master's degree in 1960 in nursing education and medical-surgical nursing. Kathi's birth in 1962 brought a professional hiatus and then came an appointment to the Capital University School of Nursing faculty in 1966. Recognized by the University as a Master Teacher, Professor Weaver also won the Praestantia Award for Outstanding Teaching in 1994. Named Professor of Nursing Emerita in 1995, she was further honored by Capital University for Outstanding Contributions to Nursing in 2010 and inducted into the Professors Hall of Honor in 2010.

Creativity and innovation characterized Professor Weaver's teaching. She offered the first ever aerospace nursing course in the free world in partnership with the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, co-authored three nursing textbooks, published in journals, and presented her thoughts on nursing education across the country. As a charter member, she helped establish the Theta Theta Chapter of Sigma Theta Tau International Honor Society of Nursing at Capital in 1986. In the classroom, laboratory, and clinical settings, Professor Weaver thought outside the box and encouraged critical thinking and risk taking in her students. A Renaissance Woman herself, she integrated the arts, sciences and humanities with nursing science for her students and supported their studies abroad. Once her student, always her student.

A celebration of the life of Barbara Redding Weaver will be held Monday November 11, 2019 at the Schumacher Gallery located in the Blackmore Library on the campus of Capital University. Hours are 4:00 PM to 6:30 PM with a Nightingale White Rose Ceremony at 6:00 PM. To honor Barbara's life the family asks that memorial gifts be made to the School of Nursing at Capital University, the Columbus Zoo Partners in Conservation or Heartland Hospice.

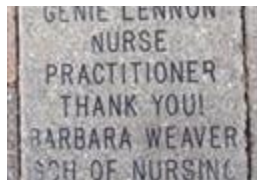
