Mom went into the hospital on her 82nd birthday, December 22nd. Over Christmas it was all about testing and discovery. What they found surprised her and everyone.

Mom was a nurse in her late teens and early 20's. That education and training stayed with her over her entire life. She knew what she was up against. Mom was comfortable and resolute in knowing that her time had come. She chose not to fight the cancer or take heroic measures to prolong the end. I admire her for making such a hard decision. What an incredible human being.

She was an independent and strong willed woman. Credit can be given to her tough upbringing in rural Kansas and her mother for educating her children to be steadfast and strong with the trails and tribulations that life throws at all of us.

The doctors did a great job managing her pain. Mom was able to see and say goodbye to family and friends before the end.

Mom slowly slipped away more and more each day. Her final day with us was peaceful. She wasn't eating in the end which is common in these cases. She was asleep the entire day. Her body began to shut down. She passed quietly at 9:45 p.m. on January 26th.

Mom gave up her early career to start raising a family with Dad. Dad worked for IBM.

They left Kansas City in '66 moving to Pittsburgh. They left there in '69 moving to their life long home in Worthington, Ohio.

Her career in most of her adult life was as the executive secretary for the Chem-Lawn Corp.. She helped the original owners build the

company to be one of the biggest in the country. She loved her job and her coworkers, many of whom became her personal friends.

Mom and Dad enjoyed square dancing in their mid-life years. She loved dressing up and dancing. Later Mom joined the Worthington Adult Choir. They sang and put on shows for the community. She loved dressing up in costume and singing in the shows. She kept many of her outfits hoping to do it again. She had a 'glamorous' side to her. Maybe she wanted to be a actress. Makes me smile when I see a photo of her in her 'Glam'".

She also enjoyed knitting and quilting. She made afghans for her children and grandchildren which will be cherished.

Playing bridge was a very important part of Mom's last years. She belonged to many clubs. Playing every week or several times per week. She loved her friends and would brag about how well she did when we spoke with her. I think it kept her sharp and was a great social outlet for her.

Her greatest love was her 'boys'. Mike, Dave and I were her focus. She was always involved and concerned with the events of our lives. Willing to do whatever she could to help. She was a great mother and not sure many could compare with her unconditional love and commitment.

All in all, she had a full and wonderful life.

She will be missed. But as everyone does, we will remember her everyday and our memories will comfort us.
