We hadn't seen him for a number of months, and in that time he had grown into a poised and self-assured young man who spoke with a degree of confidence we hadn't heard before. When Tony left that day, I regretted very much that we probably would not see him again, yet I was glad to be able to imagine him tucked into a bright future, as such a promising young man should be. I shall remember Tony as he was on that last day a few years ago, think of the young lives he strengthened through his gifted teaching, and feel thankful to have enjoyed his friendship for the few years that we knew him.
